Changes in Services or Other Significant Changes

- Water Filtration Plant (9.1% Increase)
 - 20% Increase to Watershed Inspection Program
 - Increase in chemicals for microcystin treatment
 - Add Permanent/PT Laborer
 - Cash purchase of new vehicle for Chief Operator
 - Building a Pole Barn for operations/maintenance and Vactor storage (Payback 6 years)
- Water Maintenance Department (10.2% Increase)
 - Includes Cash to replace roof at Logan Street
 - Includes budget to build pole barn for Vactor storage
 - Includes paving of Logan Street Parking Lot
 - Includes paving of stock yard by Lower Pump Station
- Water Billing Department No significant changes
 - New Bill Software Provides tracking on all work orders and efficient workforce scheduling.
 - New sensus meter system provides immediate leak detection reports

Changes in Services or Other Significant Changes

- Sewage Treatment Plant (2.2% Increase)
 - Includes full replacement of 1 Settled Sewage Pump
 - Includes funding to match NYALERT CSO Grant
 - Includes funding to begin to repurpose vacant building for maintenance staff to have a workshop
 - Begins the 4 year replacement of main bearings of final settling tanks (1 this year)
 - Provides funding to restock parts inventory
 - Provides funding to begin to demolish hazardous concrete in ORF tank
 - Provides funding to perform professional services required to list projects on the State CWSRF list, structural design for maintenance workshop, and design for the settled sewage pumps.
 - Includes \$5/1000 gallon increase to septage receiving rates
 - Includes \$75,000 to begin to fund Sewer GIS inventory project
- Sewer Maintenance Department (5.9% Increase)
 - Includes budget to self perform 2 major sewer replacement projects in 2017
 - Includes \$30,000 to slipline and perform I&I reduction projects
 - Includes funding to replace the roof at the Logan Street Garage
 - Includes funding for pole barn for Vactor storage

Changes in Services or Other Significant Changes

- Hydro Facilities (14.9% Increase): Net increase in operating budget is attributed to a \$20,000 increase in professional services
- LFGE Facility (99.4% Decrease): Drastic decrease due to closure. Operating expenses offset by rental fee for storage to WWTP.
- Landfill Fund (13.9% Decrease) Decrease in operating budget attributed to less well head overtime and energy savings associated with the methane blowers.

Items not Included in Final Budget

- Full time project manager/director of Municipal Utility projects to assist with implementation of project workload in all operating budgets. Will continue to closely coordinate with Central Services such as Planning and Engineering to obtain assistance for project management and oversight of capital projects.
- Decreased budget to phase work operations over several budget cycles such as FST tank bearing replacements, ORF tank concrete removals, and repurposing an existing building to provide for a functioning maintenance garage at the WWTP.
- Decreased cash budget for Sewer Manhole and Catch basin GIS survey and asset management program – 2 year program.
- Decreased budget to phase Logan Street and Lower Pump Station site improvements in 2 budget cycles.
- Rolls purchase of an excavator (shared with North Division Street Hydro) from operating budget into the annual equipment bond completed in spring of 2017.

- Operate Mill Street Hydro at or above operating and debt service cost.
- Identify and prioritize WWTP major project needs in next 5-10 years
- Begin to implement SCADA upgrades at Water Filtration Plant
- Implement Water GIS Asset Inventory Project
- Identify, Prioritize, and begin to replace wholesale sewer and water meters
- Settle Wholesale Sewer Intermunicipal Agreements
- Determine fair and equitable Wholesale Water Rate and settle new water Intermunicipal Agreements.
- Abandon Sewer Pump Station on Allen Street
- Continue to apply for funding opportunities as they come up
